NEW YEAR REFLECTION - PAST AND FUTURE: Liszt's Fantasy and Fugue on the Theme B-A-C-H



Happy New Year, friends! I hope 2024 brings you happiness, love, and laughter. I want to share with you the exciting music of Franz Liszt's Fantasy and Fugue on the Theme B-A-C-H which I think is fitting for this joyous occasion.

Prelude and fugue, or fantasy and fugue, is a compositional form with a long history in Western classical music. The first composer to write a prelude and fugue set was Johann Caspar Ferdinand Fischer whose 1702 collection Ariadne musica includes 20 preludes and fugues in different keys as the first of its two parts, but the one who made the prelude and fugue famous and influenced generations of composers who continued to write in this format was, of course, Johann Sebastian Bach. Bach wrote two books of preludes and fugues, The Well-Tempered Clavier, each book containing 24 sets of preludes and fugues in every possible major and minor key.

Liszt's Fantasy and Fugue on the Theme B-A-C-H was originally written for organ. He composed this piece in 1855 for the organ and later revised it in 1870 and arranged both versions for the piano. We can see a direct connection to Bach in this piece because Liszt used Bach's name theme, the famous B-A-C-H motif (Fig. 1), as the main musical theme or motif. The piece opens with a four-note motif, B flat (named B in German music nomenclature) - A - C - B natural (notated as H in German music terminology), which will be continuously repeated in different keys, voices, and registers. This motif may appear to be a simple four-note chromatic cluster, but Liszt was able to transform it during the course of the music to create different and profound meanings.



Preludes and fugues are not religious in nature, and Bach's
 WTC was not written for religious purposes either, but I believe
 that for Bach, who was a faithful Lutheran, the expression of religion was innate and native in his musical language. Do we


hear this type of religious expression in Liszt's Fantasy and Fugue? I personally think so. The use of the B-A-C-H motif alone may convey a spiritual meaning as many have argued that this four-note motif resembles the shape of a cross. Religion played an important part in Liszt's life and music, and he wanted to create a different kind of religious music that would be direct and moving rather than sentimental. I feel the presence of religious and spiritual expression in this piece, not only in the theme itself but also in the illustration of a spiritual battle between good and evil and between darkness and light from the dramatic contrasts in the music. However, this is a completely different expression of religion. The obsessive repetition of the four-note motivic cell in different rhythms and disguises and the flashy technical devices unique to Liszt make this a more personalized belief and religion, a deeply romanticized one that embraced individuality.

According to David Ledbetter, the combination of separate prelude and fugue in Bach's mature works was traditionally seen as the result of a loosening and eventual separation of the 17th c. compositions such as toccata, preludium, and canzona into two component parts. Since fugue writing was one of Bach's main interests, it is possible that his elaboration of this element resulted in a corresponding expansion of the prelude to form a matching element in a contrasting manner. In earlier composers'

preludes and fugues, there is usually a clear break between the two movements and no musical elements connecting the two besides the employment of the same key. However, in Liszt's hands, and in many later Romantic as well as 20th c. composers' works, the prelude and fugue form which was the separation of a composite in an earlier time is showing a tendency of becoming a united whole again. In Liszt's Fantasy and Fugue, he built a stronger sense of unity and connection by using the same musical materials in the two parts and by blurring the boundary between the fantasy and fugue sections. The prelude does not end in a strong cadence but slowly disappears with a long descending chromatic scale. After the descent, and with a brief breathing moment, the fugue starts with a two-note sigh motif repeating the last two notes of the prelude.

At the same time, Liszt explicitly added much virtuosity to his Fantasy and Fugue. With pervasive running octaves in a fast tempo, dazzling arpeggio passages, and rapid hand crossing, the composer transformed the traditional prelude and fugue into concert music.

While paying homage to Bach and an older compositional genre in his Fantasy and Fugue, Liszt also added his personal touch with new ideas, interpretation, piano techniques, and thematic transformation, which brought revolution to music composition and performance in the 19th century. Looking at this piece at this special time of the year, I feel inspired to reflect on the past and plan to make better choices and changes in the new year. I hope you do too:)

Thank you to everyone who purchased a gift from the Communities in Schools Angel Tree. Central was able to supply 80 gifts to 15 families!
















Our Neighborhood Christmas Festival
